HAWAII JAYCEES, LUALUALEI AND WAIANAE LIONS SPONSOR BEACH CLEAN UP IN WAIANAE ON APRIL 30

WHO: Members of the **Hawaii Jaycees** and the **Lualualei and Waianae Lions**

WHAT: These community organizations will be jointly hosting a beach clean up at Pokai Bay Beach and Lualualei Beach in Waianae.

WHEN: April 30, 2005, 2:30 p.m. - 4:00 p.m.

The Hawaii Jaycees are teaming up with the Waianae and Lualualei Lions on April 30 to work in the Waianae community to help beautify the beaches at Pokai Bay and Lualualei. The project will coincide with the Hawaii Jaycees first trimester state convention to take place at the Makaha Golf Resort from April 29 to May 1.

Hawaii Jaycee members from as far away as Hilo will be attending this convention.
