*Flagship community service projects* providing the arena for development include: the Keiki ID program, the Honolulu Marathon Startline, the 50<sup>th</sup> State Fair, the Hilo County Fair, the Springfest Carnival (Hilo), the Miss Chinatown and Narcissus Queen Pageants, the Cherry Blossom Festival and Pageant, the Three Outstanding Young Persons program, and the World Exploration cultural program.

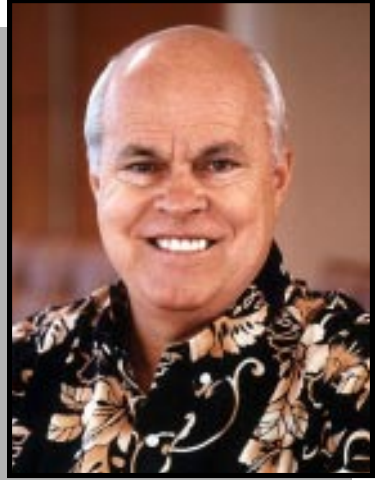

# History of Hawaii Jaycees

## In the beginning...

The Jaycee movement in Hawaii first began in 1932 with the formation of the Honolulu Junior Chamber of Commerce. In 1940, the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce President Perry Pipkin came to Hawaii to help start the state organization. The Hilo and Wahiawa Junior Chamber of Commerce were formed, followed by the Maui Junior Chamber of Commerce in 1941.

The advent of World War II, however delayed the formation of the territory wide organization as many Jaycees entered military service. Those who remained at home undertook many active programs of service by a participating in activities such as surveying potential air raid shelters, the Kiawe Corps, distributing gas coupons and establishing victory gardens.

Early in 1943, the Hawaii Junior Chamber of Commerce was formed. The Articles of Incorporation and the by-laws of the Hawaii Junior Chamber of Commerce were adopted. R. Allen Watkins, the past president of the Honolulu Junior Chamber of Commerce, was elected its first president of the state organization. During 1944, many vital projects were coordinated by the Hawaii Junior Chamber of Commerce across the territory. The Kauai Junior Chamber of Commerce was formed during that year.

Forceful and constructive action made the Jaycee movement in Hawaii invaluable to every phase of Hawaiian life. Our organization has many achievements include helping to start many projects that have since become institutions in Hawaii. Among these is the Blood Bank of Hawaii, the 50th State Fair, the Miss Hawaii Scholarship Pageant, the Honolulu Youth Symphony, Aloha Week, Teen Challenge, and the Special Olympics.

The Hawaii Jaycees came to the aid of the state in 1982, when Hurricane Iwa devastated the island of Kauai. The Hawaii Jaycees responded to the emergency by initiating the transport of supplies to the needy families on the island. In 1983, the Hawaii Jaycees stepped forward to help fund the Hawaii

# History of Hawaii Jaycees

Silver Jubilee Anniversary Program which celebrated Hawaii's 25 years of statehood. They stepped in with a fund-raising project through the sale of a silver jubilee coin and a souvenir magazine, with monies from the sales helping to fund all the programs for the celebration that year.

In 1984, United States Jaycees and the Hawaii Jaycees voted to accept women into the organization. The dissolution of the Hawaii Jaycees Women's organization followed in 1985 and many members of organization joined the Hawaii Jaycees. The Hawaii Jaycees elected its first woman president, Brenda Yee, in 1987.

During the late 1980s and early 1990s, Hawaii Jaycees continued their community contributions through projects such as the Great Hawaiian Rubber Duckie Race for United Cerebral Palsy, Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership Seminar, the Mount Pinatubo Disaster relief fund, Magic Spectacular for the American Cancer Society, the Haunted House for March of Dimes, and the Three Outstanding Young Persons of Hawaii recognition program.

At the turn of the millenium, the Hawaii Jaycees returns to its roots. We are focusing on our beginnings as a pioneering community service organization while laying the foundation for leadership growth. With the inaugural sessions of the Leadership Training Academy, the Hawaii Jaycees will be graduating and certifying its first class of leaders. Each of them will have formal training in strategic and operations management, finance and accounting, marketing and sales, and practical leadership.

The Hawaii Jaycees are a non-profit corporation, composed of more than 15 chapters throughout the state with approximately 500 young men and woman sharing the Jaycee experience.

# The Chapters



*The Alakai Jaycees @ HPU* was chartered by the Honolulu Chinese Jaycees in 1995, with the purpose to provide young people at Hawaii Pacific University the opportunity to gain and develop personal and leadership skills through community and organizational involvement. Alakai has continued to strive to fulfill the mission through active planning and implementation of large-impact projects that range from promoting cultural awareness through World Exploration, to a fun competition between chapters through Jaycees Olympics, to providing career building opportunities such as Resume Workshop and Self Marketing Seminars and personal investing seminars.



*The Ala Moana Jaycees* was chartered in October 1963. Some of its signature projects include the Start Line for the Honolulu Marathon and the food tent for the March of Dimes WalkAmerica. The primary emphasis of the Ala Moana Jaycees is the development of leadership skills and experiences to help individuals advance their careers while making positive contributions to the community. Members learn to manage finances, priorities, and most importantly, people through seminars, training sessions, and speakers. However, the most valuable experience is gained when members apply these skills through service projects, a real win-win situation.



*The East Hawaii Jaycees* was chartered in 1990 as an affiliation of the Lehua Jaycees. A culturally based chapter, consisting mostly of persons of Filipino ancestry, the East Hawaii Jaycees receives tremendous support from the Big Island Filipino Community Council. The East Hawaii Jaycees annually organizes its flagship project, The Young Miss Hawaii Filipina Scholarship Pageant. This pageant is opened to young girls between the ages of 9-12 who are of Filipino ancestry. The girls are judged on interview skills, athletic participation, turno design and talent. The East Hawaii Jaycees annually fundraise for this project by participating as a food booth vendor at the Springfest Carnival and the Hawaii County Fair.



*The Hawaii Business Jaycees* was founded and sponsored in April of 1991 by thirty employees of Bank of Hawaii who were community minded officers and corporate vice presidents. The chapter's primary emphasis is to allow its members to create innovative community service programs that address short and long-term needs within the community while learning project management, communication, and organizational skills. The chapter's secondary purpose is to provide its members with the skills through service projects that enhance their respective careers and ability to be promoted.

# The Chapters

***The Hawaii Kai Jaycees*** was established in 1994 by the Maui Jaycees. Its goal is to develop its members to become future leaders in the community. It does this by doing community service projects such as the Fall Blast (a fundraiser for the River Of Life Mission), the Relay for Life (a fundraiser for the American Cancer Society), and the Keiki ID project (we work with HPD) to name a few. It also offers the members the opportunity to develop themselves by offering them leadership training such as Resume Writing, improving their speaking and writing skills, and going through the Personal Improvement Program.



***The Hilo Jaycees*** was chartered on September 15, 1939 by the Honolulu Junior Chamber of Commerce (now known as the Honolulu Jaycees). It officially affiliated with the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce on February 29, 1940. The Hilo Jaycees is the second oldest Chapter in Hawaii, and as such, has chartered other chapters on the Big Island: Lehua Jaycees (1965) and the Kona Jaycees (1952). The Hilo Jaycees has a sister chapter relationship with the Honolulu Jaycees and with the Hiroshima Junior Chamber of Japan. Major projects of the Hilo Jaycees include the Hawaii County Fair, the Hilo Jaycee Scholarship, the annual Easter Egg Hunt, the Salvation Army Thanksgiving Luncheon and many more.



***The Honolulu Chinese Jaycees*** was founded in 1953 by Dr. Wai Sen Char. Members come from many cultural and professional backgrounds to develop their leadership skills by participating in professional programs, assisting with community service projects and having fun at social and sports activities. The Honolulu Chinese Jaycees also had the honor of hosting the 1997 Junior Chamber International World Congress. This event brought over six thousand delegates to Hawaii from over 100 countries around the world. An organization of boundless opportunity, HCJ has played a key role in training Hawaii's young leaders. HCJ is the organization of choice to help young people improve their professional skills, assists the community, develop long-term friendships and ensure Hawaii's future with strong, young leaders.



***The Honolulu Junior Chamber of Commerce*** was founded in May 1930. Renamed the Honolulu Jaycees, this chapter has compiled an enviable record of service to the community, and has initiated a number of projects that have become an integral part of the community. The 50<sup>th</sup> State Fair, The Blood Bank of Hawaii, Miss Hawaii Pageant are some of the most enduring and outstanding projects that the chapter has created.



# The Chapters



*The Honolulu Filipino Junior Chamber* has developed relationships with the FilCom Center and the Filipino Chamber of Commerce and has provided support to various community events, including the Annual L&L Community Christmas Lunch, the AT&T FilCom Parade, Special Olympics, Hawaii Food Bank, Self-Help Housing & MADD. The chapter includes members from diverse professional, educational and cultural backgrounds. The HFJCC is dedicated to giving back to the community while supporting the personal and professional development of its members. Past members include: Judge Rey Grauly, Supreme Court Justice Mario Ramil, Dr. Fort Elizaga, and FilCom President/Entrepreneur Roland Casamina.



*The Honolulu Korean Jaycees* was founded in 1994 to create opportunities for its members to develop themselves, serve their community, and to perpetuate the Korean culture in the State of Hawaii. Its mission is to create leadership growth and individual development opportunities for its members through community service, social and training programs. The chapter's primary emphasis is to allow its members to create innovative community service programs that address short and long-term needs within the community while learning project management, communication, and organizational skills.



*The Honolulu Japanese Jr. Chamber of Commerce* continues its efforts to foster young leaders through professional development, community service and the promotion of Japanese culture and Japanese American heritage. The Young Business Roundtable creates opportunities for young professionals to explore and engage in business development, networking and community service. The other major program of the chapter, the annual Cherry Blossom Festival, is the chapter's signature program. The festival offers Junior Chamber members many and varied experiences in developing, exploring and improving their personal and leadership skills, while providing our island community with an enjoyable and exciting celebration.



*The Kauai Fil-Am Jaycees* was officially chartered into the National and Hawaii organization on March 29, 1979 with Oscar Portugal as the founding president. The Kauai Fil-Am Jaycees was recognized in the community for its diversity in many different areas. Some of its annual projects include the Halloween Haunted House for charitable organizations, Christmas caroling island wide, and a golf tournament for the March of Dimes. The Chapter also assisted in the gathering of donations for the Mt. Pinatubo disaster in the Philippines. After Hurricane Iniki in '92, they rebuilt the bleachers and repainted dugouts at Hanamaulu Park and assisted in the building of the Kamalani Playground.

## The Chapters

*The Leeward Professional Development Jaycees* was founded in 2002 to provide working professionals with an opportunity to develop network contacts and to increase their visibility throughout the island by way of community oriented projects. The chapter has a strong business sector orientation and is dedicated to developing leadership skills that will aid its membership in maximizing their professional and personal potential. Currently, the chapter is based in the Aiea and is committed to servicing the Leeward area, but it also is involved in activities throughout Oahu.



*The Lehua Jaycees* was chartered on May 25, 1965 in Hilo, Hawaii. Shortly after coming into being, the Lehua Jaycees took on the Miss Aloha Hawaii Pageant from the Hawaii Island Chamber of Commerce. Lehua is known for its many larger scale projects in the Hilo community, such as the Fourth of July Fireworks Display, Hilo Christmas Parade, Keiki Fishing Derby and the Springfest Carnival.



*The Manoa Jaycees* has helped the community by working with the Manoa Lions Club to give out candy and provide music to the Annual Christmas Parade in Manoa. It also sponsors the Manoa Craft Fair at Manoa Elementary. For many years, it has provided manpower help for projects such as the Honolulu Festival, Honolulu Marathon and the Taste of Honolulu. Congressman Ed Case is a former member of the Manoa Jaycees.



*The Rising Phoenix Jaycees* has always been one of the TOP 5 Chapters in the State of Hawaii. Its success is directly proportional to the quality and caring of our officers, directors and members as well as its programs and projects. These projects have included Meals on Wheels, Clean-A-Park, Adopt-A-Home, in which the chapter adopted the Maunalani Center and visited throughout the year, and running the Rubber Duckie Race for the United Cerebral Palsy. Besides these and other community fundraising projects, its chapter has a strong sports program of volleyball, as well as individual development programs such as public speaking workshops and chapter socials.



## *Member Expectations*

***Be Active.*** Everything offered in the Jaycees – Leadership Ability, Personal Development, Service to Community and Lasting Relationships - are only available to the active member, the one who attends all meetings and who works hard on all assigned projects.

***Be Committed.*** There is no such thing as a good, half-way Jaycee. Jaycees come with goals and purposes; we have soul. We require commitment to Jaycee ideals from our members, demand dedication to hard work which calls for a deep understanding of the problems of people. If you can make this commitment, you will be an invaluable member of your chapter.

***Be A Contributor.*** Do not be shy. Your chapter needs your contribution and ideas. Learn to speak in public, think out ideas thoroughly, and present a reasoned argument in support of your views.

***Be Efficient.*** Efficiency is one of the keys to advancement. It is important that, whatever task you have, you understand what you have to do. You need to participate fully with the others involved and make your contribution to the best of your ability. Do not be afraid to ask if you do not understand. Do not hesitate to seek help if you feel this is necessary. Be the member who does what he or she has to do conscientiously—and not those who shirk responsibility and cause failure.

***Be Dependable.*** The member who can be counted on at all times is the member who will go right to the top. Many good projects fail because only one person let the team down.
